



Is it safe to play?

The backyard is a good spot to play.

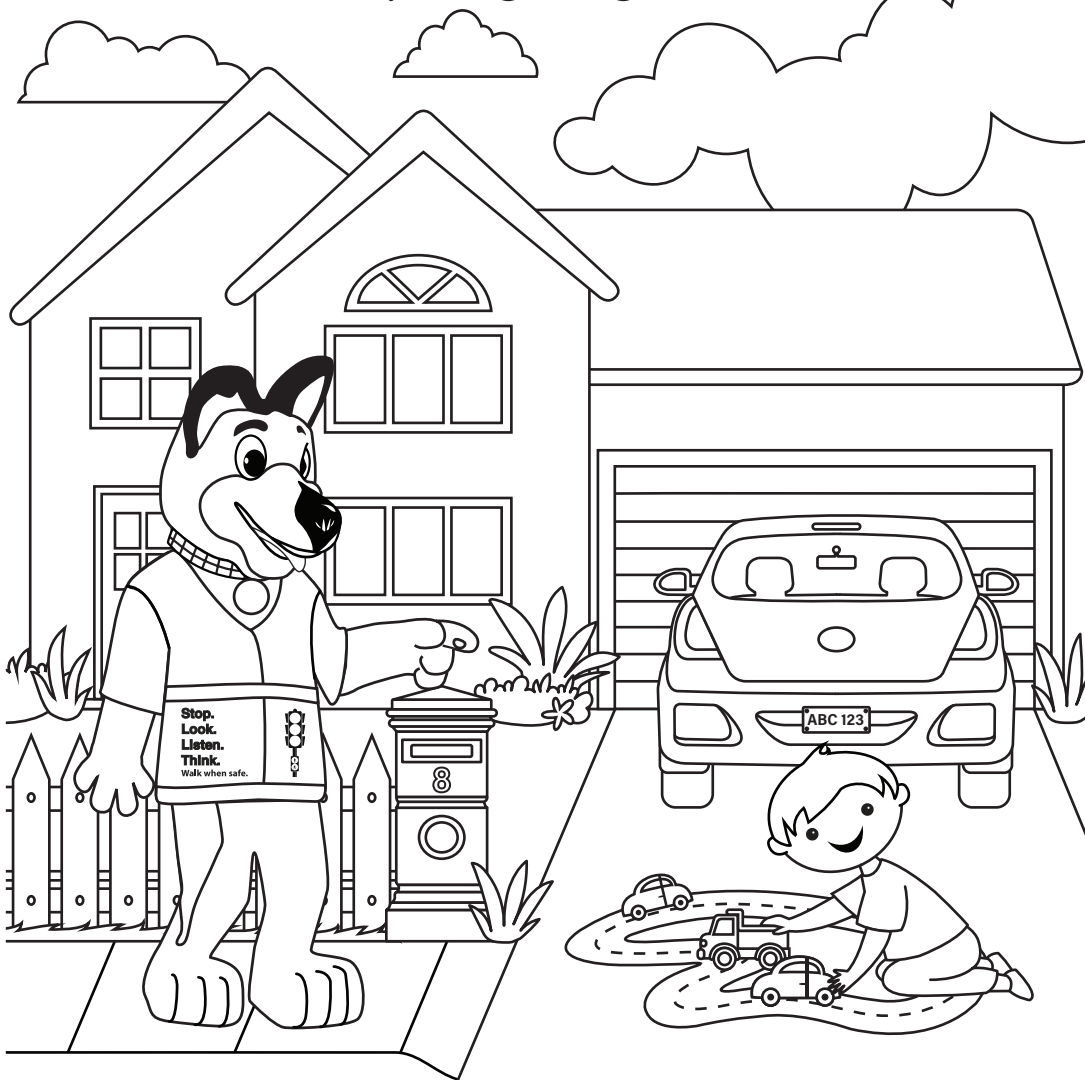


The next morning Bob plays

SAFE PLACES TO PLAY

Tips for parents/guardians

It is important to ensure your child/children play in a safe location when they play outside.

Please reinforce with your child/children:

- Playing in the backyard or in a park are safe places.
- Reinforce the dangers of playing near roads and near cars (parked, stationary and moving).
- Remind your child/children to never chase anything onto the road. This includes balls, toys and pets. Tell them to ask an adult to get it.
- Every time you cross the road, make sure you and your child/children do the kerb drill.
 - **STOP** a step back from the road and never on or in the kerb.
 - **LOOK** to the right, then to the left and then to the right again to make sure the road is clear of traffic.
 - **LISTEN** for any traffic.
 - **THINK** is it safe to cross?
