Mock roadway - Safety and road rules

Welcome to the mock roadway. To enjoy your time safely on the mock roadway we have put together some information to teach your child about road safety and the road rules they need to learn to navigate the track safely.

Safety equipment

All participants riding a bicycle or scooter on the mock roadway must wear an approved bicycle helmet. Ensure:

- the helmet sits on top of the head and not on the back of their head leaving their forehead unprotected
- there are no more than two finger spaces between their eyebrows and the lower edge of the helmet
- their ears are inside the 'V' of the straps; adjust the clips so they sit just under the ears
- you hear a 'click' when the helmet is done up
- the chin strap has no more than a two finger space between their chin and the strap.

Road and safety rules on the mock roadway

For the safety of everyone using the mock roadway it is important to ensure that your child:

- knows how to use the brakes on their bicycles
- shoelaces are tied correctly and are not long and loopy or they may become tangled in the pedals
- wear an approved bicycle helmet
- make sure they are riding sitting on the bike seat
- keeps left at all times whilst riding on the mock roadway
- rides at a safe speed so they are able to stop if they need to
- does not deliberately bump into other people.
