

## Mock roadway

The mock roadway is a great way to teach young pedestrians and cyclists about road safety in a safe environment.

The mock roadway helps children to become familiar with:

- correct road signage
- traffic lights and crossings
- pedestrian safety
- road rules.

The roadway includes:

- an intersection with traffic lights
- pedestrian crossings
- a roundabout
- traffic signs.

The Road Safety Centre is located in the south-western corner of Thebarton Police Barracks. The mock roadway is located on land belonging to the City of Adelaide, in the south-western corner of Bonython Park. It is fenced from the main area of Bonython Park, providing a degree of security for participants.

All vehicles coming to the mock roadway must enter Bonython Park via either of the two entrances shown. Follow the roadway to the main car park and park in there. It is only a short walk to the entrance gate of the mock roadway, as shown.



The mock roadway is available for community use on weekends and between 8.00 am and 10.00 am and after 2.30 pm on weekdays (including school holidays). If the 'DO NOT ENTER' signs are up, please do not use the mock roadway as it is booked for a SA Police session. Call (08) 8207 4668 to check availability. The mock roadway is available free of charge but participants need to bring their own bike and helmet. The mock roadway traffic lights operate seven days a week between 8.00 am and 6.00 pm and 8.00 am and 8.00 pm during daylight saving.
