A driver is four times more likely to be involved in a crash while using a mobile phone, even if it's hands-free.

LEARNER'S PERMIT AND P1 LICENCE DRIVERS



You are **BANNED** from using **ANY** type of mobile phone function while driving.

The mobile phone ban includes:

-  using hands-free mode including Bluetooth technology
-  loud speaker operation (including listening to music)
-  GPS
-  text and video messaging.

These laws apply to drivers and riders of all vehicles.

FULLY LICENCED AND P2 LICENCE DRIVERS

Using your phone while driving

You must not use a hand-held mobile phone while your vehicle is moving or is stationary in traffic (e.g. at traffic lights). You may, however, use a hand-held mobile phone while your vehicle is parked.

A mobile phone may only be used while you are driving to make or receive a phone call, provided the phone is secured in a commercially designed and manufactured mounting device affixed to the vehicle, or the phone can be remotely operated.

If the phone is used via Bluetooth or a headset or earphones without touching it, holding or resting the phone on your body, you may touch the headset or earpiece to operate the phone.

It is an offence to create, send or look at a text, video or email and to rest the phone on any part of the body.

Using a phone includes:

- Holding the phone in your hand.
- Operating any function of the phone.

- Resting the phone on any part of your body.

These laws apply to drivers and riders of all vehicles.
