Re: Freedom of Information Act application

In reference to your application made pursuant to the Freedom of Information (FOI) Act 1991, access was sought to:

"I specifically seek access to:

- 1. All internal correspondence between SA Police's Far North Local Service Area, executive staff and the Deputy Commissioner regarding police resourcing issues in the Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara (APY) Lands, sent/received between March 2016 and the date this request is processed.
- 2. All internal correspondence between SA Police's Far North Local Service Area, executive staff, and the Deputy Commissioner regarding internal reporting and recording of domestic violence incidents in the Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara (APY) Lands, sent/received between March 2016 and the date this request is processed.
- 3. Any internal reviews commissioned following the death of outback nurse Gayle Woodford in March 2016."

On 28 May 2018 I spoke with you via telephone and you clarified the scope of Part 3 of your request to:

"Exclude documents relating to the SA Police investigation into the death of Mrs Gayle Woodford and this includes all documents created for the purposes of court proceedings and the State Coroner.

Include documents created in response to Mrs Gayle Woodford's death that relate to SA Police responses, including general patrols, to incidents involving remote area emergency health care nurses."

On 17 August 2018 I spoke with you via telephone regarding consultation pursuant to section 25 and 26 of the FOI Act 1991. You excluded the following from the scope of your application:



"Personal affairs of third parties and information that may lead to their identity as well as the affairs of all law enforcement, Government agencies and others with the exception of SA Police."

In relation to Part 1 & 2 of your request:

- "... 1. All internal correspondence between SA Police's Far North Local Service Area, executive staff and the Deputy Commissioner regarding police resourcing issues in the Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara (APY) Lands, sent/received between March 2016 and the date this request is processed.
 - 2. All internal correspondence between SA Police's Far North Local Service Area, executive staff, and the Deputy Commissioner regarding internal reporting and recording of domestic violence incidents in the Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara (APY) Lands, sent/received between March 2016 and the date this request is processed..."

South Australia Police (SAPOL) has located documents that fall within the scope of your request. The documents are numbered and described in the following schedule. The schedule contains the details of the determination in compliance with section 23. In particular, note the grounds on which access has been refused, including the reasons which are contained in the schedule.

Clause 16 (1)(a)(v) of Schedule 1 of the FOI Act which states:

"A document is an exempt document if it contains matter the disclosure of which could reasonably be expected to have a substantial adverse effect on the conduct of industrial relations by an agency;"

Clause 16 (1)(b) of Schedule 1 of the FOI Act which states:

"A document is an exempt document if it contains matter the disclosure of which would, on balance, be contrary to the public interest".

In relation to Part 3 of your request:

"... 3. Any internal reviews commissioned following the death of outback nurse Gayle Woodford in March 2016."

No documents could be located that fell within the scope of Part 3 of your request.

If you are dissatisfied with the determination for access to SAPOL records, you are entitled to exercise your right of internal review in accordance with section 29(1) of the FOI Act by completing a PD362 Application for Internal Review form which can be downloaded from https://www.police.sa.gov.au/services-and-events/freedom-of-information or available upon request at your nearest police station. Alternatively an application may be made in writing to the SAPOL Freedom of Information Unit. This application must be lodged within 30 days from the date of this determination with a fee of \$34.25. Such a fee may be waived in the event of an exemption being claimed.

Purpose

To provide the South Australian Out of Scope with a summary of South Australia Police (SAPOL) commitment to policing of remote Aboriginal Communities in the Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara (APY) Lands.

Background

SAPOL has maintained a continual presence on the APY Lands since 1986 when Community Constables and Community Constable Supervisors were first appointed. Until August 2003, and the commencement of the Marla Support Plan, Community Constables on the Lands were supported by sworn police officers from Marla. However, the capacity of Marla police to provide an appropriate level of support challenging.

Since 2003 the level of police commitment into the APY Lands has steadily increased t.

Discussion

- SAPOL has 20 permanent sworn police positions on the APY Lands within the communities of Amata (4 general patrol members), Ernabella (4 general patrol members), Mimili (4 general patrol members), Murputja (3 general patrol members), and Umuwa (1 Officer in Charge, 1 detective, 2 family violence investigators and 1 intelligence officer).
- These members provide an operational, intelligence, family violence and criminal investigation response across all APY communities and homelands.
- The Fregon community is serviced by police officers stationed from the Mimili Police Station with support from other locations including Ernabella and Umuwa. The next largest community is Pipalyatjara which is serviced by police officers from Murputja with support from Amata.
- Five permanent sworn police positions are based at Marla and provide policing services to the APY communities of Indulkana and Mintable.
- A further three sworn police positions are on secondment and based at Umuwa.
 These members provide additional investigative capacity to address sexual abuse issues on the APY Lands.
- There are ten Traditional Community Constable positions allocated to the APY Lands.
 However, despite continued efforts by SAPOL, only three are currently filled.
- A Police Aboriginal Liaison Officers (PALO) role was introduced as a supplementary method to work in partnership with sworn police officers and the community. SAPOL has a PALOs employed at Amata and another at Ernabella.
- SAPOL has an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Employee Coordinator who
 continues to work closely with key stakeholders and the communities to actively
 identify potential Community Constables and PALOs.

- SAPOL continues to be actively engaged in various community safety programs including the community patrol program managed by the Out of Scope
- Community Safety Meetings in each major community continue to be coordinated by the Officer in Charge APY Lands. These meetings are designed to encourage Anangu people to work with SAPOL to find solutions to crime and disorder issues within their communities.
- Police participate in a regular radio segment on APY radio. This provides a medium to communicate police related issues to individuals and communities across the Lands.
- SAPOL developed Community Safety Plans in each of the major communities across the APY Lands. The Plans are a guide for community members on how they should respond in the event of an emergency including: fire, storm, earthquake and flood and the support they can expect from emergency response and support services.
- Police continue to promote Blue Lights activities throughout the APY Lands and these activities are well attended and frequently conducted in association with Out of Scope youth programs team and school holiday activity coordinators. The Out of Scope agency that provides support and programs for families, children and victims of domestic violence across the APY Lands.

Cross Border Activities

- Generic legislation exist that enable SAPOL, WAPOL and NTPOL to police across the entire NPY Aboriginal Lands of central Australia without restrictions of State boundaries. This is supported by corresponding judicial processes. A memorandum of understanding exists between jurisdictions and police now regularly engage in cross border policing activities in accordance with the Cross Border Justices Act 2009 and operational protocols.
- The Cross Border Enforcement Team is a Commonwealth funded partnership between the jurisdictions with the objective to detect and prevent substance abuse within the NPY Lands. Based in Alice Springs team and supported by officers across the region, they work together to coordinate resources and intelligence to focus upon the disruption, detection and apprehension of persons engaged in the smuggling and disbursement of alcohol, petrol, cannabis and other illicit drugs amongst communities within the NPY Lands region.



2. RELEVANT POINTS

2.1 General Information

 The APY Lands cover an area of 93,379 square kilometres in the North West of South Australia (SA), adjoining the Northern Territory (NT) and Western Australia (WA) borders. The APY Lands are part of the Ngaanyatjarra, Pitjantjatjara and Yankunytjatjara (NPY) Lands, home to 11 communities and 70 outstations, which extend some 350,000 square kilometres across the borders of SA, the NT and WA.

Map of NPY Lands

 In 2008 the Commonwealth Government allocated a funding package of \$15 million to enhance police infrastructure across the APY Lands, and included the construction of Police, Court and residential facilities at Pukatja (Ernabella), Amata and Mimili.

2.2 SAPOL Operational Capacity

- SAPOL maintains a constant police presence across the APY Lands through an ongoing weekly FIFO (fly in, fly out) program. Police stations are located at Amata, Mimili and Pukatja (Ernabella). As of March 2017, there are 23 sworn Full Time Equivalent (FTE) positions and ten (10) Community Constable FTE positions based on the APY Lands. The Officer in Charge of the APY lands works from the police administration building in Umuwa,
- The 23 FTE sworn positions include three (3) temporary positions comprising one
 Criminal Investigation Branch Investigator and two Senior Constable Victim Management
 Investigators to the APY Lands. These additional positions were placed on the APY
 Lands, at the police administration buildings in Umuwa, in response to recommendations
 of the '2008 Children on APY Lands Commission of Inquiry: a Report into Sexual Abuse'
 (the Mullighan Inquiry).
- Included in the 23 FTE sworn positions is the police presence in Murputja (3 FTE staff) which encompasses the communities of Murputja, Kalka, Kanpi, and Pipalyatjara. Murputja was chosen as the most appropriate location to place SAPOL officers in the western part of the APY Lands as it is approximately half way between Amata and Pipaylatjara. From this location the staff provide a general patrol response to the communities to the west including Kalka, Kanpi, and Pipalyatjara (106 kilometres west), but also a relatively quick backup response capacity for SAPOL officers located at Amata (100 kilometres east).
- In addition, there are five sworn police FTE positions at Marla. Whilst the Marla Police Station is not physically located on the APY Lands, the members are responsible for policing the Indulkana Aboriginal community and Mintable Township.

2.3 Pipalyatjara

- Pipalyatjara is the most western major community within the APY Lands and has a
 population of between 200 and 300 people. The community, by road, is approximately
 880 kms south west of Alice Springs, and 1735 kms North West of Adelaide.
- There is a small police complex at Pipalyatjara (tin shed). However, on inspection, it is in need of some minor refurbishment to make it fit for purpose as a police office.

- The nearest police stations geographically to Pipalyatjara (refer to previous map -yellow flag) are:
 - o Blackstone (red flag) in Western Australia (70 kilometres to the west); and
 - o Amata (red flag) in South Australia (206 kilometres to the east).
- As detailed previously, and while no police station exists, a police response (3 FTE staff) is available from Murputja (orange flag) (106 kilometres to the east). Travel time from Murputja to Pipalyatjara is between 45 minutes and 1 hour, dependent on road conditions. The road is a graded non-constructed dirt/sand road that can become impassable in adverse weather conditions or at the very least increase travel times significantly.
- Whilst the current Cross Border Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) has no provision for Western Australian Police (WAPOL) to provide a specific response to the western portion of the South Australian APY Lands, WAPOL do provide operational support to the region.

Policing presence at FREGON community APY Lands

BACKGROUND:

The members of the Fregon commu	unity have raised the issue of a need for a
permanent police station in their Co	mmunity in the APY lands. This issue has been
raised previously a number of times	and more recently with the Out of Scope

RELEVANT POINTS:

Fregon community is situated around 80 kms from the Mimili community in the APY lands. The policing of the Fregon Community is the responsibility of the Mimili based police officers. Police officers based and living in Umuwa also attend in response to significant issues and incidents in Fregon. There have been a number of significant issues in the previous 12 months that has required the attendance of officers from both Mimili and Umuwa to Fregon.

If there is a general police response required to Fregon then the Mimili officers are the initial responders. The Mimili officers also service Fregon community with motor vehicle and Licence enquires and they also attempt to resolve any disputes between local community members through mediation and consultation. They also hold community safety meetings and promote dialogue between Police and community members.

The response and attendance time at Fregon can take the local officers out of the Mimili community for 4 to 8 hours. This can also depend on the nature of the incident and the road and weather conditions at the time of the response. There are Community Night Patrol officers working in Fregon. One of their roles is to advise police if they consider a police response is required to a situation or incident.

There is no police compound in Fregon community or permanent police accommodation. There is a "police shed" which provides basic amenities for visiting officers and provides a location for the taking of statements and meeting community members. There is no provision for overnight accommodation for police at Fregon.

After hours calls for police assistance to Fregon normally come through the Officer in Charge of the APY lands. The calls and requests for assistance are assessed and the appropriate response determined and provided. The calls may come direct from Fregon community members, from Port Augusta Police Station or the police Communications Centre.

There is no additional police on the APY lands that can provide a continuous policing presence in Fregon. Currently there are no plans to provide a police station or permanent police officers to the Fregon Community.

Police statistics show that most domestic violence offending occurs in a dwelling, with the category of house alone accounting for 71% in 2014-15, 72% in 2013-14 and 69% in 2012-13.

Domestic Violence predominantly occurs behind closed doors.

We need to remain active in reporting and supporting victims to speak up.

Domestic violence is everybody's business.

Figure 17 compiled by SAPOL shows the 30 suburbs in South Australia that recorded the highest number of offences flagged as domestic violence per 1,000 population (according to the ABS 2006 Census) in 2014-15. By converting the information in this way, there are meaningful comparisons across suburbs of different populations.

SAPOL also notes that to ensure sufficient analytic meaning, only suburbs with a minimum of 10 recorded offences flagged as domestic violence in 2014-15 have been included in the analysis. This excludes suburbs that may have a comparatively high rate of offences flagged as domestic violence where this is driven by a low number of offences and low population. The Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara (APY) Lands were therefore excluded.
